Quartz & Rocks for Rockhounds

Rockhounds often seek out rocks that have "agatized " meaning rocks made up of quartz, few of which are true agates. Quartz is sought after by rockhounds because of its hardness and its ability to be worked by cutting and polishing. The various forms of quartz make up the largest and most common group of lapidary materials.

Quartz minerals are formed by the dissolving and redeposition of silica within other pre-existing rocks. Diatoms and other small sea creatures may have provided the silica available to form quartz within Wyoming's Paleozoic limestones. Whereas, the great quantities of silica found in Tertiary volcanic debris are likely sources for silica contributing to the development of many of Wyoming's agates, petrified woods, and jaspers.

Impurities and trace elements that are incorporated or included within the original silica solutions or the absorption of impurities after the quartz material has been formed are responsible for the vari-

ous colors and inclusions that form the different types of quartz. Quartz occurs in more variety, colors, crystal forms and environments than any other mineral.

Not all of the varieties of quartz may be found in Wyoming but the following classifications & descriptions will motivate rockhounds to search, swap, and purchase all of the varieties of quartz to complete their collections.

CLASSIFICATION OF QUARTZ

A. Crystalline Quartz (macrocrystalline)—occurs as visible crystals with vitreous shiny luster. Macrocrystalline quartz when exposed to concentrated light is usually transparent to translucent unless the light is affected by impurities or inclusions.

Varieties of Crystalline Quartz: may be found in geodes, vugs, or faults-fractures-joints.

Amethyst: purple variety of quartz

Amethyst Quartz: Mixture of amethyst and milky quartz

Aventurine: translucent to opaque, massive quartz containing small foreign mineral inclusions creating a glistening effect. Color usually green but may be orange, brown, or yellow

Citrine: yellow, orange-brown, or reddish brown

Milky Quartz: white, translucent to opaque

Quartz Crystal: colorless, transparent with well developed crystals

Rose Quartz: pink color, massive

Rutilated Quartz: transparent quartz with golden yellow needle-like Rutile inclusions

Smoky Quartz: black or dark brown (smoky) quartz

Tourmalinated Quartz: transparent quartz with black or dark green tourmaline inclusions B. Chalcedony: (cryptocrystalline) crystals not visible with normal magnification & not shiny unless polished. Cryptocrystalline quartz in its pure form is transparent when exposed to concentrated light. When a small amount of impurities or foreign materials are added, the color of the cryptochrstalline quartz changes and its ability to transmit light decreases creating semitransparent to translucent varieties.

Varieties of Chalcedony Quartz :

Agate: banded / patterned / multi-colored layers within chalcedony quartz

Bloodstone: dark green dotted with small red blood-like spots

Carnelian: transparent to translucent, reddish color

Common Chalcedony: waxy luster, nodular or massive form, white or lightly colored

Chrysoprase: apple green in color

Geode: a hollow rock with agate around quartz or chalcedony

Prase: translucent, light green to light grayish green color

Sard: brownish and brownish red, transparent to translucent

C. Sedimentary Quartz (microcrystalline) crystals only visible with high magnification & not shiny unless polished. Geologists classify chert, flint and jasper as varieties of sedimentary rocks based on how they were deposited and are not varieties of the mineral chalcedony. Chert, flint, and jasper are all chemically similar, in that they all are composed almost entirely of silica (quartz); but have been given different names based on the coloration caused by impurities and how they were formed and deposited. Chert, flint,

and jasper, contain enough impurities and foreign material to render them opaque = with concentrated light no light passes through the material.

Varieties of Sedimentary Quartz:

Chert: opaque, massive, granular, uniformly colored, dull, light colors: tan, brown, white, gray, or green. Chert is usually of biological origin, being the petrified remains of siliceous ooze with limited organic matter. This biogenic sediment covered large areas of the deep ocean floor, and also may contain the silicon skeletal remains of microfossils.

Flint: opaque, massive, granular, uniformly dark brown, gray to black colored with a waxy appearance. Flint and chert are identical except that flint forms in chalk or fine grained limestone (carbonates) that are rich in organic matter and reduced iron which allows silica to replace the carbonate and form dark colored flint. Flint is often times found with a white chalk or limestone coating that represents the original carbonate.

Jasper: opaque, massive, granular, uniformly dark colored: red, yellow, orange, brown, or green. Jasper is also chemically identical to chert and only varies in color as a result of trace elements that are present in the rock as iron that is oxidized or reduced to form darker colors.

D. **Chalcedony Pseudomorph:** foriginal organic/inorganic material replaced by chalcedony quartz

Varieties of Chalcedony Pseudomorphs:

Petrified Wood: formed by chalcedony dissolved in groundwater that replaces or duplicates original patterns of wood

Petrified Bone: formed by chalcedony dissolved in groundwater that replaces or duplicates original patterns of bone

Limb-cast: formed as chalcedony filis and replaces the external form of cavities created by the decay of plant roots, limbs and stems

Opal: chalcedony combines with water found in the cavities left by decayed organic materials.

Tiger Eye: chalcedony replaces fibrous asbestos

Rockhounds through ancient times searched for quartz based materials to fashion their tools, weapons, and jewelry. In addition to the above referenced minerals, they also utilized silicate rich rocks such as metamorphic quartzite and igneous rhyolites, basalts, and obsidian. We present day rockhounds do not search out minerals and rocks for our survival but it is a lifelong hobby that keeps us moving.

Topic: How To Sand And Polish A Slab Or Geode Half Quickly

Here is my method of sanding and polishing slabs and geode halves in just a few minutes. It involves sanding with a dry silicon carbide 8" by 3" belt on an expanding drum. I used the 100 grit on this demonstration slab because the saw marks were so deep. On most slabs with smooth saw cuts I use a well worn 220 grit. On the backs of larger cabs, I use the 220 grit. For smaller cabs (1"), I use a 400 grit. I never sand dry on the girdle of the cab or on the rounded edges of the dome. It will definitely burn the cab as evidenced by white spots on the surface. If you are working a thicker slab (this one was 3/16" thick) or a geode half you can do the sanding steps faster because there is more mass to the piece and it won't heat up as fast or require more time to cool the slab when it over heats.

I have used this same method with a 400 grit belt to do obsidian. It works great with obsidian flats. One problem occurs if you sand on the edge

closest to you. The edge chips and the chips get drug across the slab and cause scratches. That is why I always sand on the lower half away from you. Any chips that occur are drug away from the surface being sanded. Obsidian is not heat sensitive like most agates are.

Here is a photo of the slab that I will demonstrate on. I will intentionally leave one end of the slab in its original condition as a comparison. It is a Brazilian Agate and the saw marks are very rough and rather deep. (See Photo 1)



(Photo 2) is of the 100 grit belt that has moderate wear to begin with. When you feel of the grit surface you can feel the grits rather easily but they are not sharp. Because the sanding is done dry you must use a high quality dust mask. I use these N95 rated masks that can be purchased at most hardware or paint stores. **Breathing crystalline silica dust can cause silicosis, which in severe cases can be disabling, or even fatal. As silica dust is breathed in and enters the lungs, it causes the formation of scar tissue which reduces the lungs' ability to take in oxygen. There is no cure for silicosis. Since silicosis affects lung function, it makes one more susceptible to lung infections like tuberculosis.**

I always sand only in one direction, parallel to the long direction of the slab. I sand a few strokes (four or five) and feel the slab. If it has gotten hot enough that you can't comfortably touch it, stop and wipe it with a damp cloth to cool it down. Don't wet the belt because it will wash the rock



dust out of the belt. Your objective is to get a buildup of dust on the belt. Stop

Photo 3 is after 3 or 4 minutes of sanding. Photo 4 shows the finished sanding after only 12 minutes?

I look, using a concentrated light source, for any remaining diagonal saw marks (one of the reasons I always sand in only one direction, preferably across the saw marks) and for very shallow fine sanding marks. Turn it a couple directions to check for sanding marks. If there are no remaining sanding marks, the slab is ready to be polished.



Photo 5 shows how the sanding belt looks after the sanding process. More dust than when I started. The buildup of rock material on the sanding belt is what makes for increasingly finer sanding. If I wet the belt and wash the rock powder off, it goes back to leaving very noticeable sanding scratches until the powder builds up again. A new belt definitely leaves significant scratch marks until it is broken in.



Next I go to my 12" diameter, carpet covered wheel with Cerium Oxide paste. I have used a polishing wheel with elk hide, rough side out but I didn't like the fact that the elk hide seemed to be either too wet or too dry, not the semi wet/dry condition for ideal polishing with carpet. I use the carpet wheel for nearly all my polishing activities. It has two main advantages:

1. The knap holds the polish embedded within it much better and longer than a leather hide will.

2. It holds the moisture for a much longer time than the elk hide, thus the ideal wet/dry condition maintains itself much longer-- sometimes up to 5 minutes or more before I have to respray the wheel with water. See Photo 6

If rock hounds fail to speak up now in favor of hobby collecting, the BLM may have to abandon that part of their "preferred alternative" due to a preponderance of negative comments. Super Blood Wolf Moon Eclipse



On the night of Sunday, January 20, 2019 sky-watchers across North and South America watched a rare cosmic event, as three lunar phenomena converged to give rise to what some people are calling a super blood wolf moon.

1. During totality, the full moon does not disappear entirely and instead turns a rusty shade of red, earning it the name "blood moon."

2. This lunar eclipse happens to coincide with the wolf moon, the traditional name for the January full moon.

3. What's more, the moon will be unusually close to Earth and so will be slightly bigger and brighter, making it a so-called supermoon.
